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COURSES

GEOG/GEOL 103 (3 credits): Our Dynamic Planet* GEOG 452 (3 credits): Geoscience Field Experience GEOG 452 (6 credits): Geoscience Field Experience (students may have up to 12 hours on transcripts)

* This class fits into Exploration Level of the Colonnade Program under category C Natural and Physical Sciences. This course fulfills the Category D Science general education requirement for students entered WKU in Spring 2014 or earlier.

** This class fits into Connections Level of the Colonnade Program under category B Local to Global.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Mystic Landscapes of the Emerald Island is a program designed to explore the Republic of Ireland and Norther Ireland from a physical, cultural and environmental geography perspective. This is a three-week program that starts and finishes in Dublin along with an opportunity to circumnavigate the entire island while exploring these themes. As this program is now in its seventh rotation there has been many relationships created with locals to create an amazing program for the students to explore and investigate the area. This program travels by bus with an experienced driver that the program uses regularly.

Students will have the opportunity to register for one or two courses for this program. These courses are both included in the general education requirements at WKU. Geography 103 in in the explorations category and Geography 452 is in the Local to Global category. Students may take both of the courses or six hours of the 452 course. Many students from a variety of majors are drawn to this program because of the flexibility of the courses within their graduation requirements. In the six years we have had just a handful of majors from the department but a majority of our student come from all the colleges.

PROGRAM LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Learning Objectives for Colonnade Program: This course fulfills the Colonnade Program requirements for the Local to Global subcategory of the Connections category. As part of that programs, students in GEOG 452 meet the following learning objectives: Students will demonstrate the ability to:

- 1) Analyze issues on local and global scales.
- 2) Examine the local and global interrelationships of one or more issues.
- 3) Evaluate the consequences of decision-making on local and global scales.

Learning objectives for GEOG 452: The course objectives for GEOG 452 are designed to integrate fully with the Colonnade Program. Upon successfully completing GEOG 452, you will be able to:

• Demonstrate critical thinking skills related to the five main themes of geography, (location, place, human environment interactions, movement and region), at local, regional, and global scales.



GLOBAL LEARNING AND

- Evaluate local systems, particularly the cultural and/or physical landscape, to understand their position and influence in the global context.
- Describe how geographic analysis and principles allow for a deeper understanding of the evolution of a place in an effort to better understand and predict future changes to the cultural and or physical landscapes of a location.
- Describe and analyze the relationship between the five themes of geography, (location, place, human environment interactions, movement and region) to evaluate how local practices can affect these themes on global and local scales.
- Compare the local physical landscape formation and change within its position in the global physical landscapes.
- Investigate how locations it together, with surrounding location, in a n established mosaic understanding how they contribute and connect with the others.
- Observe the local ideology and or physical landscape of a place to draw comparisons of these observations to the earner's sense of place.
- Describe the impact of globalization, particularly the movement of people, goods and ideas, on the cultural and /or physical landscape.
- Understand how people make decisions in their local environment and how those decision impact their connection to the larger global system.
- Analyze how global decisions making can impact smaller, local systems.

PROGRAM DETAILS

LOCATION: Ireland

ACADEMIC TERM & PROGRAM DATES: May 14 – June 5, 2024 (Departure from US on May 13 for those choosing Group Flight Option)

ITINERARY (subject to change)

May 13: Depart for Ireland

May 14: Arrive at Dublin Airport and meet with your driver/guide who will transfer you into the city centre where you will first visit St. Patrick's Cathedral, founded in 1191 and burial place of Jonathan Swift, author of Gulliver's Travels. Next, it's on to the iconic Guinness Storehouse, the official home of 'the black stuff'. Overnight: Dublin

May 15: Journey north and check out the various locations within the historic Boyne Valley. Visit the Neolithic passage tomb of Newgrange, Ireland's most famous prehistoric monument that date back to times before the Great Pyramids of Giza were built. Next, it's onto the Hill of Tara which was once the ancient seat of the High Kings of Ireland. Overnight: Dublin

May 16: This morning, visit Trinity College Library and the Book of Kells Exhibition on foot this morning before meeting your driver for the visit to St. Michan's Church and Crypt. The evening, enjoy an Irish night consisting of Irish food, music and dance at the Merry Ploughboy. Overnight: Dublin

May 17: Visit Kilmainham Gaol and Glasnevin Cemetery. The former is one of the largest unoccupied gaols in Europe, covering some of the most heroic and tragic events in Ireland's emergence as a modern nation from the 1780s to the 1920s. Glasnevin subsequently is Ireland's largest burial site and many of its tombstones read like a 'who's who' of Irish history. Overnight: Dublin

May 18: Head south to County Wexford to visit Seal Rescue Ireland. Learn about their conservation efforts and the work they do including the rescue and rehabilitation of seal pups found injured or orphaned off the coast of Ireland. Overnight: Dublin



May 19: This morning, begin your journey south. On the way, visit Charleville Castle which is said to be the finest example of gothic-revival architecture in Ireland. After your visit, enjoy some free time for lunch in the County Offaly town of Tullamore. Next, visit Leap Castle to learn about its spooky history. Overnight: Kilkenny

May 20: After breakfast travel to Jerpoint Park, a working farm situated over the lost city of Newtown Jerpoint before enjoying some free time for lunch in Waterford. Overnight: Kilkenny

May 21: Depart Kilkenny and journey to the historic town of Cashel where you will visit the Rock of Cashel, a spectacular group of medieval buildings set on an outcrop of limestone in the Golden Vale including the 12th century round tower, High Cross and Romanesque Chapel, 13th century Gothic cathedral, 15th century Castle and the restored Hall of the Vicars Choral. Next it's onto Blarney Castle where you can kiss the Stone of Eloquence which is said to grant the "gift of the gab". This evening enjoy the Ghost Bus Tour in Killarney. Overnight: Killarney

May 22: Enjoy a tour of the Dingle Peninsula. The town of Dingle is a small fishing port where you will find plenty of pubs, cafes and restaurants to have lunch. Then to the west of the town the scenery is particularly rugged with views out to the formerly inhabited Blasket Islands. Stop at the Beehive Huts and hold a baby lamb! Overnight: Killarney

May 23: Enjoy a day tour of the Gap of Dunloe and the Three Lakes of Killarney. From Kate Kearney's Cottage take jaunting cars up the Gap of Dunloe to Lord Brandon's Cottage where you will have time for lunch (not included) before travelling through the Three Lakes of Killarney to Ross Castle. Overnight: Killarney

May 24: Journey north towards the archaeological site Craggaunowen in County Clare which interprets Ireland's prehistoric and early Christian era. Next, it's onto the majestic Cliffs of Moher before checking in to your local accommodation. The remainder of the evening is free to explore the local amenities. Overnight: Lahinch Coast

May 25: Enjoy a trip through the Burren, an area composed of limestone hills that are home to an extraordinary array of flora, wildlife and megalithic tombs and monuments older than Egypt's pyramids. On your journey north via the Corkscrew Hill, stop at Poulnabrone Dolmen, a portal tomb that was built more than 5000 years ago. Next it's onto Aillwee Cave and the Birds of Prey Centre before continuing onwards to Galway where the afternoon is free to explore. Overnight: Galway

May 26: Explore another of Ireland's famous scenic regions, Connemara. Here the constantly changing cloud formations give hills, lakes and peat bogs an added dimension. Visit Connemara History & Heritage Centre, where you will be introduced to the history of the area from prehistoric times to the foundation of the Irish Free State and visit Dan O'Hara's Homestead. Next onto Kylemore Abbey which is home to the Benedictine Nuns where you can visit their walled garden and Gothic church whilst enjoying the tranquility of the estate; Connemara Marble Visitor Centre where demonstrations by their master craftsmen will amaze you. Overnight: Galway

May 27: Explore Day in Galway to explore at your own pace. Overnight: Galway

May 28: Travel to the largest of the Aran Islands, Inis Mor, by ferry. On arrival, you will be met and taken on a tour of the island by Gabriel O'Faherty. Enjoy a visit to Dun Aonghasa, a majestic piece of history that sits on the verge of a 100 metre high cliff. Next, it's on to the beehive huts. Overnight: Inis Mor

May 29: Aran Island extended tour. These consist of a visit to the Worm Hole, a naturally formed swimming pool that is a big hit with visitors, a trip to Gabriel's goat's cheese production business as well as a seaweed tasting and shore walk. Overnight: Inis Mor

May 30: Take the early morning ferry crossing back to the mainland and journey north towards the county of Sligo, colloquially known as Yeats Country due to its close ties with the famous poet W.B. Yeats. Climb Knocknarea, home to the ancient burial site of Queen Maeve of Connacht. Overnight: Sligo



May 31: Venture north towards Derry this morning, the only remaining completely walled city in Ireland. On arrival, enjoy a Derry walking tour with a local guide upon arrival. The remainder of today is free to explore at your own pace. Overnight: Derry

June 1: Travel east and visit the 16th century Dunluce Castle whose kitchens fell into the sea one stormy night in 1639 before travelling onto the UNESCO World Heritage Site, the Giant's Causeway. Formed millions of years ago by volcanic activity, the site consists of thousands of interlocking basalt columns. Next, begin your journey south towards Belfast, stopping en route at the Gobbins Path originally built and aimed at Edwardian thrill-seekers! Overnight: Belfast

June 2: Tour of Belfast with local guide and visit the Peace Walls. Next, it's on to Titanic Belfast, the iconic six story building with a gleaming, angular edifice which houses a multimedia extravaganza documenting everything there is to know about the famous liner. Learn about how Belfast became a shipbuilding superpower at the beginning of the 20th century along with the creation and construction of the world's most famous vessel. Overnight: Belfast

June 3: Travel back to Dublin and enjoy an Explore Day. Overnight: Dublin

June 4: Visit Epic Ireland and immerse yourself in the story of emigration. This evening, see the worldwide phenomenon, Riverdance. Overnight: Dublin

June 5: Depart Ireland from Dublin Airport

The schedule is subject to change due to educational opportunities that may arise unexpectedly, the vagaries of weather, and other factors beyond the control of the course instructors and staff.

- Students must possess a passport valid for at least six (6) months after return date. Or valid ID for air travel within the United States (domestic programs)
- Students must be free of active disciplinary sanctions as verified by the Office of Student Conduct.
 - Students who become ineligible to attend the program after applying due to disciplinary sanctions will be subject to standard program cost penalty rates. Students are responsible for notifying the Office of Global Learning & International Affairs when they become aware of this ineligibility.
- Students must complete all pre-departure orientations.
- Full payment is due prior to date of departure.



PROGRAM FEE

Estimated Program Fee: \$6899 - \$7399* + Airfare (Group Flight Cost Estimated at \$1500)

*Final Program Cost is dependent on final group size. Cost may ultimately be lower, but all students applying for the program need to be prepared and plan for the higher end of the program cost range.

Flights

- When applying for the program, students will be asked to select if they want to be on the group flight or will arrange their own airfare. This decision is final.
 - **Group Flight-** Students choosing this option will have their airfare arranged by WKU flying in and out of Nashville (BNA) and airfare cost will be billed to Summer TopNet account along with Program Fee
 - Arrange Own Airfare- Students choosing this option will be responsible for booking their own airfare and paying the airline directly for their flight cost. Arrival and departure parameters will be provided to students.

• Travel ID Requirements - Each participant must have a passport that includes an expiration date which is 6 months beyond the last date of the program. Please begin application process no later than 4 months prior to departure.



- Physical Considerations- Students will be engaged in activities that do involve walking. One walk will be 5 miles in length. The program leader will work with students that are not able to walk that distant but students should be in good physical condition.
- Logistics-
 - For those choosing to arrange their own airfare, flights should not be purchased until receiving permission from the office of Global Learning & International Affairs
 - Arrival and departure parameters: Arrive on morning of May 14 (or before) and Depart on or after June 5
 - It is highly recommended that participants purchase flight cancellation insurance, which could include Cancel For Any Reason (CFAR) travel insurance.
 - Should the program be cancelled or the participant withdraw, the participant is responsible for contacting the airline(s) to cancel their flight and for any cancellation fees that may apply.
