PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

This 12-day adventure features opportunities to traverse rainforests, work with local community members, and participate in conservation and environmental studies all the while discovering the magnificent natural beauty of Costa Rica. Special emphasis will be placed on developing a cross-cultural awareness and service ethic within an environmental worldview. In addition to being exposed to the best practices of ecotourism, students will pay it forward through participation in a service project.

The courses, REC 482 and REC 482G, are being offered through a joint effort between the School of Kinesiology, Recreation, and Sport and the Intramural/Recreational Sports Department.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- Develop an appreciation for and an understanding of the historical, sociological, and ecological character of Costa Rica;
- Have a firm understanding, through immersion in the local economy, of the cultural similarities and differences of a global society;
- Develop and build an appreciation for and an understanding of the diverse geographical character of Costa Rica;
- Discuss the influence of the diversity of natural wonders of Costa Rica and ensuing influence on ecotourism and community development;
- Explain and discuss the various natural resource management challenges facing private recreation operators and government planners in highly traveled areas such as Manuel Antonio National Park;
- Demonstrate group and personal leadership skills that include effective communication, judgment, decision-making, tolerance, inclusion, and risk management;
- Develop an appreciation for the strong contribution of service projects to local people, communities, and the environment;
- Recognize the various methods of instruction for learning;
- Have a basic understanding of conversational Spanish; and
- Discuss and articulate your role in a global society through community and environmental service in the host county.

ELIGIBILITY

- Undergraduate or graduate students in good standing.
- Permission of instructor(s) is required.
- Current WKU students eligible to register for WKU courses may apply. Students from outside WKU may participate as <u>visiting students</u>.
- Students must be 18 years of age or older at time of departure (parent/guardian permission for anyone under 18 at time of departure).
- Students must possess passport valid for at least six (6) months after return date.
- Students must be free of active disciplinary sanctions as verified by Judicial Affairs.
- Students must complete all pre-departure orientations.
- Full payment prior to departure is required.
- Students must complete the <u>Study Abroad & Global Learning application process</u> prior to being registered in this course. We suggest you start this application process immediately and respond to all emails promptly.
