ACCOMMODATIONS

Iquitos, Peru is the largest urban center in the western Amazon with a population of approximately a half million. The group will stay at a hostel within the city.

The days on the Amazon River will be aboard a riverboat with small cabins and eating facilities, along with the stay at the Madre Selva Biological Research Station.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

This collaborative course includes an option for (1) a second fall bi-term course with Winter Term travel component or (2) a Winter Term course. The program is designed for doctoral students in the EdD in Educational Leadership and Master's students in Social Responsibility and Sustainable Communities. Research-focused undergraduates are invited to participate.

The SRSC is the first interdisciplinary Master's program devoted to sustainability and community leadership, while the EdD in Educational Leadership is the first stand-alone doctoral program at WKU. Both programs seek to prepare students to be productive, engaged, and socially responsible citizen leaders of a global society. These courses will provide students an opportunity to include an international aspect in their program of study as well as the opportunity to meet with international leaders and work in international communities.

Bi-Term + Winter Term Package –The program fee includes Peru winter program costs, but does not include the 3-credit hour tuition.

- Graduate students would be enrolled in a Fall 2013 ISCR or EDLD second bi-term course and will complete the course requirements in the Iquitos, Peru travel component.
- Full-time undergraduates would also be enrolled in the Fall 2013 GWS second bi-term course within their full-time semester course load. The additional program fee includes the Iquitos, Peru travel component. Students considering this program should contact <u>Dr. Olmsted</u> right away to discuss the course requirements.

Winter Term Package –The program fee includes Peru winter program costs, including the 3-credit hour tuition.

Service learning component - The Orosa River, a tributary to the upper Amazon River, is home to several small communities. Project Amazonas is a non-profit organization that works to serve the people of the Amazon and conserve the rainforest and has established a field station in this area and is working to build a health clinic to serve the local communities. Doctoral student and course intern Christian Ryan-Downing is working with Project Amazonas President Devon Graham to identify and coordinate a serve-learning project to be completed by group. Evidence of well-intended but

unsuccessful projects in these communities illustrates the importance of a project helpful to the local communities, as well as meaningful to students. Ideas under consideration include recycling and composting workshops (to complement a new waste program), fundraising for procurement of solar chargers and water purifiers, and conducting workshops focused on equipment use, and how to install composting toilets for the community schools.

- Students will be provided opportunities to examine human-environment interactions in urban and rural settings.
- Student will employ experiential learning (City as Text) as a means to understand the dynamics of place and community.
- Students will analyze leadership practices in an international setting.
- Students will develop field research skills through individually designed projects.
- Students will be provided the opportunity to engage in service learning

- Graduate student in good standing (Graduate Catalog p.30).
- Undergraduate students with 3.2 cumulative GPA or good standing in the Honors College.
- Permission of instructor(s) is required.
- Current WKU student eligible to register for WKU courses may apply. Students from outside WKU may participate as visiting students.
- Students must be 18 years of age or older at time of departure (parent/guardian permission for anyone under 18 at time of departure).
- Students must possess passport valid for at least six (6) months after return date.
- Students must be free of active disciplinary sanctions as verified by Judicial Affairs.
- Students must complete all pre-departure orientations.
- Full payment prior to departure is required.

LOGISTICAL CONSIDERATIONS

- The base program begins on December 28, 2013 in Iquitos and ends in Iquitos on January 12, 2014. When you book your flight, make sure you arrive for the start of courses.
- The Machu Picchu Extension begins on January 12 and ends on January 16, 2014. While the extension is highly encouraged, it is NOT part of the required program, therefore, each participant will be required to confirm the extension by October 1, 2013. We suggest you book your return flight on January 16 to leave after 3 pm at the earliest.
- Independent travel (before and/or after the programs start and end date) is permitted, but each participant should confirm travel plans with program leaders since there would be medical insurance requirements.

Passport Requirements - Each participant must have a passport that includes an expiration date, which is 6 months beyond the last date of the voyage. The expiration must be beyond July 20, 2014.
